#### From the Executive Director

The year 2005 is critical in our efforts to achieve property tax reform on behalf of our member associations across Ontario. We will report quarterly to our members on our progress. We are going to need them to be informed and we are going to need their help if we are to achieve success.

What is success? Our objective in 2005 is to halt any further shift of tax onto waterfront properties. Why is 2005 critical? Because the province cancelled the 2004 assessment. The 2005 assessment will, unless action is taken, shift even more tax onto the waterfront in 2006. How do we know that? Because taxes are distributed based on assessment and waterfront values across Ontario continue to rise faster than values off the water.

The first Annual Meeting of WRAFT was held on November 6. We sent our members the minutes of that meeting, as well as a copy of my speech to the FOCA annual meeting on the same day. The speech is posted under News on this web. It provides a review of the progress to that date. I will quickly update that report:

- Our membership now stands at 98 associations, close to our target of 100 by year-end.
- Our fundraising continues. By year end we had raised \$134,000 in donations, \$19,000 in membership fees and \$25,000 in contributions from the founding members. After expenditures of \$48,000 we had \$130,000 in the bank.
- Meetings with Queen's Park politicians and staff continue and we are identifying a professional lobbyist who can help us in our efforts.
- We are starting a campaign to build political support

Research has begun on precedents for property tax reform in other jurisdictions in Canada and the U.S.

# Official Plan Report for Addington Highlands

Currently there is little to report on the topic of the Official Plan. It has received Addington Highlands Council Approval --- and last heard (early in the New Year) it was awaiting approval (or not as the case may be) by the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing.

Following approval, the township, as we understand will commence work on a zoning bylaw. Slow moving , but progress is being made.

# Mazinaw-Lanark Forest Management Plan 2006—2026

Ontario's forests are managed for a broad range of uses and to conserve economic, social, environmental and cultural values. To achieve sustainability, forest ecosystems must be maintained in a healthy state, and the value of the forest to all users must be respected.

In Ontario, anyone operating in a Crown forest is required by law to manage for the long-term health of the forest. Through MNR's forest management planning process, forest managers plan to ensure that the forests of Ontario will remain healthy in the future, and sustainable benefits are provided for the province, such as timber and other commercial products, recreation opportunities, and wildlife habitat.

Although the management of Crown forests in Ontario is the responsibility of the provincial government, this responsibility is shared with forest products companies or groups of companies

Sixty-six percent of Ontario, or about 70.4 million hectares -- almost 174 million acres - is forested. About 90 percent of Ontario's forests are owned by the province. Of that area, some 31 percent, or about 22 million hectares, is classified as production forest - that is, forest managed for a full range of benefits, including timber production.

Crown land is the principal source of wood for Ontario's forest products industry. For management purposes, the Crown forest in Ontario is divided into management units. Most of these management units are managed by individual forest companies under a Sustainable Forest License (SFL). The SFL holder is responsible for carrying out the activities of forest management planning, harvest, access road construction, forest renewal and maintenance, monitoring and reporting, subject to MNR regulations and approvals. Before any forestry activities can take place in a management unit, there must be an approved forest

<u>Public consultation</u> is a key component of Ontario's forest management planning process, and includes the following provisions:

- stakeholder and interest group representation on a local citizens committee to assist the planning team with the preparation of a forest management plan;
- a formal public consultation process, including public notices, public information forums and opportunities to review and comment on planning documentation;
- provisions for special consultation efforts with Aboriginal people;
- direct consultation with stakeholders and interested and affected parties in the planning of forest operations;
- a formal process for the resolution of issues; and
- a final opportunity to request the Minister of Environment to order an individual environmental assessment of specific proposed forest management activities

As an integral part of the planning process, a local citizens committee is required to assist each planning team with the preparation of the forest management plan. The committees represent a range and balance of local interests, and ensure that these interests are communicated to the planning team. Each local citizens committee may <u>nominate a member to participate on the planning team</u>.

# Approved 2005/2006 Annual Work Schedule **Mazinaw-Lanark Forest Management Unit**

The Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) has approved the 2005/2006 annual work schedule prepared by Mazinaw-Lanark Forest Inc. for the Mazinaw-Lanark Forest Management Unit (Crown lands within Lanark County and parts of Frontenac, Lennox-Addington and Hastings Counties).

The annual work schedule describes forest operations (i.e. road construction and maintenance, harvesting, regeneration, tree planting and tending operations) that may occur between April 1, 2005 to March 31, 2006. These activities are consistent with the approved 2001-2006 Mazinaw-Lanark Forest Management Plan. Further information about tree planting jobs can be obtained from the Mazinaw-Lanark Forest Inc. office at the address below. Limited fuelwood opportunities are available consisting of tops and other woody debris left over from harvesting operations. A fuelwood permit must be purchased in advance from the Ministry of Natural Resources. Private land access, road closures, as well as other timing restrictions may affect the availability of fuelwood in specific areas.

The annual work schedule, and all subsequent revisions, is now available for public inspection and will remain available for inspection during normal business hours for its one year term at the MNR's Bancroft and Kemptville District offices and at the Mazinaw-Lanark Forest Inc. office (see addresses below).

### Why is the shore foamy?

What causes the foamy surface often found on some lake waters? This foamy is not a new phenomenon and nor does it indicate a problem. The foaming is a natural process that has been going on for a very long time. All lakes contain organic matter, such as algae, rooted aquatic plants and leaves. When this organic matter decomposes through natural bacterial action, it releases cellular products to the water, which form a surfactant, or surface agent. This surfactant lessens the surface tension of the water, making it susceptible to foaming.

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#### FAST FACTS ABOUT ONTARIO FISHING LICENCES



Most Canadian residents need an Outdoors Card to fish in Ontario if they are at least 18 years old but have not reached their 65th birthday.

If you have never had an Outdoors Card, you can request an application form be mailed to you by phoning the Outdoors Card Centre from anywhere in Canada at 1-800-387-7011.

Your Outdoors Card is good for three calendar years. You must have a fishing licence tag on the back of a plastic Outdoors Card OR a "Resident Fishing Licence and Outdoors Card Application" in order to have a complete and valid licence for fishing.

If you are a Canadian resident between 18 and 65 years of age and you want to fish in Ontario right away, you can buy a "Resident Fishing Licence and Outdoors Card Application" from one of more than 2,000 licence issuers across the province. A temporary paper license is effective immediately and valid until December 31 of the year in which it was purchased.

The fee for a temporary paper license includes the cost of a three-year Outdoors Card.

If your Outdoors Card will soon expire, or has already expired, the fastest and easiest ways to renew your Outdoors Card are a three year renewal by credit card with a call to 1-800-288-1155 or online at the MNR Store.

Nancy and Heather agreed to meet in August.


Update: Nancy turned over all Lake Steward and FOCA information to Heather.

# How to make a Secchi disk



# How to measure the transparency

Readings. To obtain a reading, lower the disk into the water until it disappears. Take a reading from the rope and make a note of it. Lower the disk even deeper and bring it back up until it reappears and take another reading. Repeat this operation 3 times and take the average of the readings. All readings should be taken on the shaded side of the boat.

Number of measures per season. It is highly recommended that readings be taken 4 times, spaced out during the period from the middle of July to the middle of August. Never before, never after that period! Secchi readings as well as temperature and oxygen concentration readings must be taken during that critical period of time. Moreover, all Secchi readings must be taken from the same place on the lake, the place where temperature and oxygen measurements are taken.

# The Pearson Family Memories

This is the story of Skootamata Lodge and my father **George Pearson**. My Grandfather, George Albert Pearson Sr. owned a radio company in Indianapolis ,Indiana and later in Chicago, Ill. He had a salesman in Canada who was Ross Obornes' father. Ross's father came to my grandfather one winter day all bundled up and my grandfather said it must be cold where you come from. Ross's Dad said yes, but the summers were beautiful and he thought my grandfather should build a cabin for his family on Skootamatta lake. It was called Loon Lake then but was later changed because there were to many loon lakes.

My grandfather agreed and said that Ross's father should buy a large parcel of land and start construction of a summer home for his wife Wilhelmina and his son George Jr. my Dad. My father and grandmother took the train into Kaladar back then and were driven to the area known as Trails end. They then had to take a boat to their new summer home. This is the cottage currently owned by the Halperines. My father was 14 at the time which would have made it 1925.

Another family from Indianapolis who were friends of my grandparents were also building next door by the name of Moore. Their son Clayton would go on to play the Lone Ranger on television for many years. Unfortunately their cottage was burned to the ground some years later and all that can be seen today is the boat house next door to the Halperines boat house. Both buildings are as they were when originally built for the most part. My Dad's father hired local people to help with the running of our cottage. There was Jim Meeks who worked around the property and would hunt and fish with my Dad frequently. Nancy and Charlie Spencer helped with cooking and other chores around the place. There were numerous fireplaces in the main cabin and adjoining guest quarters such as the stone room. No electricity except what was provided by a generator brought up later. No direct phone lines although my father rigged his own line to connect to the landing to send messages. Ice was cut in the winter for use the next summer and stored in the ice house at the foot of the hill. My Dad would carry the large blocks himself up the hill to the kitchen. Beer was always left in the saw dust for the men who would come to cut the ice each year. Eventually electricity did come to the lake and everything was updated.

My father also told stories about taking the local children he would see standing by the side of the road to school in his car. That was when the school was one room. He became so attached to the students of the local school that he later setup an award fund for graduating eighth graders that **still exists today**. My grandfather died around 1949. My Dad was stationed in Denver, during the war so did not have much time to go to Canada. After marrying my mother in 1948 there was not much time for the lake either. My Dad sold the cabin which was neglected for many years except for a brief claim to fame when it was used by a Canadian Movie company for one of it's movies. Eventually the Halperin's purchased it and returned it to it's previous use as a warm and happy family retreat. My father also owned most of what is known as the North shore gradually selling off all except for the shoreline we currently call home.

This year will be the 80<sup>th</sup> year for the Pearson and now Jasuwan family to have been on the lake. We have come to know the people on the lake over the years and the people in Cloyne as well.and hope that many generations will come to know and enjoy this beautiful lake as my father and grandfather did before us.

When was the last time you had your septic checked? If you can't remember, it's time NOW!

Let's make sure future generations can enjoy a clean lake as we have been able to. It is a small price to pay for the lakes' health.

#### SEPTIC FAILURES LEADING CAUSE OF LAKE POLLUTION

A failure of a septic system can cause serious problems. Sewage can pond on the ground near the drainfield or back up into buildings. Animals and people may become ill from contact with these discharges. Pollution from failing septic systems of contaminate ditches, creeks and shallow drinking water supplies.

Waste material from the house enters the septic tank where:

- Heavier solids settle to the bottom and form a sludge layer.
- Lighter wastes such as oil and grease rise to the top and form a scum layer.

When waste enters the tank, bacteria begin to break down the solid materials. This break down reduces solids, but also leaves a residue behind in the tank. As time passes, this residue builds up, and must be removed to prevent it from entering the drainfield and clogging the system. The center liquid layer flows slowly from the tank into the drainfield. Perforated pipes allow the liquid to be equally distributed in a gravel-filled disposal field. Once the liquid reaches the disposal field, it soaks into the soil. The soil then acts as the final filter for treatment of waste received from the septic system.

## Do's if you are on a septic system

- Connect laundry and kitchen water to septic tank.
- Have your septic tank pumped out by a licensed operator every 2-3 years.
- Learn the location of your septic tank, drainfield and well. Keep a sketch of it handy with your maintenance record for service visits. Obtain a copy of your septic permit and map inspection, if possible.
- Divert other sources of water, like roof drains, house footing drains, and sump pumps to lawn areas away from the septic system. Excessive water floods the system, keeping the soil in the drainfield saturated and unable to adequately treat the wastewater.
- Take leftover hazardous household chemicals to your approved hazardous waste collection center for disposal. Use bleach disinfectants, and toilet bowl cleaners sparingly and in accordance with product labels.
- Cut the grass over the disposal field. Shorter grass (around 2-3 inches) increases plant activity called evapotranspiration. This process removes nutrients from the disposal field through the root system, and increases evaporation.

#### Limit water entering your tank:

- Use water-saving faucets, showers, and toilets.
- Drain appliances one at a time.

# Dont's if you are on a septic system

- Don't go down into a septic tank. Toxic gases are produced by the natural treatment processes in septic tanks and can kill humans in minutes. Extreme care should be taken when inspecting a septic tank, even when just looking in the lid opening.
- Don't allow heavy vehicles to drive over or park on the drainfield.
- Don't plant trees or shrubs on the drainfield. The roots from the plants could damage the system.
- Don't cover the drainfield with a hard surface such as concrete, asphalt above ground pools or decks. The area should have only a grass cover.
- Don't use commercial septic tank additives. These products usually do not help and some may hurt your system in the long run.
- Don't use your toilet like a trash can or poison your septic system and the groundwater by pouring harmful chemicals and cleansers down the drain. Harsh chemicals can kill the beneficial bacteria that treat your wastewater.

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

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
