

A Small Piece of History

The story of an original log cabin on Oborne Point

All of our cottages have a great deal of personal history attached to them. We build memories, we take part in stories that become legends, and we raise our families there. Along the way, we develop a deep love and respect for the lake and the unique communities that become a part of our lives at the lake, and become a part of our story. This is a story of one such cottage.

Thirty-three years ago, the Arthurs purchased their current cottage on Oborne Point Road. and while the stories that their family have created since then are rich and numerous, the history of the cottage actually dates back much further, to almost 90 years ago.

You may have read the story about Albert Ross (Tiny) Oborne in the 2012 newsletter. That story included the details about how Tiny purchased the land on the tip of what is now known as Oborne Point Road. In 1922, at the time of purchase, it was an island, with no connecting road. Since then, the road was built, attaching the island to the rest of the point. After purchasing the island, Tiny convinced several other people to purchase land and build on "Loon Lake", which we now know as Skootamatta Lake. The original log cabin that comprises the main structure of the Arthurs' cottage was one of these first buildings on Oborne Point.

The log cabin was built by a local man known as "Indian Joe" in 1928. It sits on the west shore of Oborne Point, with the two acre property stretching across

the peninsula to the east side. The cabin walls were built with pine logs measuring about ten inches in diameter, and the gaps are sealed with mortar.

Additionally, there is a beautiful stone fireplace in the cabin, that still stands today. The picture on the far left was taken from down the hill toward the lake. The original roof was supported with narrow cedar logs and planked with pine boards of varying widths. The logs and boards are still visible, adding to the authenticity.

In the early 1930s, the cabin and lot were purchased by Frank Seddon. Not a lot is known about the Seddon family or their time at Loon Lake. The cottage would have been a lot of work to maintain (as all cottages are). Daily tasks such as cutting wood, hauling water, cooking, and cleaning would have been interspersed with time spent enjoying the lake and the companionship of other early inhabitants of the Point.

In 1949 the Moir family bought the cottage. At that time, the road only went as far as Trail's End, leaving another mile to hike to reach the cottage by foot. The road was later extended to the end of the point, and a driveway onto the property was built, making for much easier access.

Over the years, the Moirs made a variety of additions to the cottage to make it more comfortable. The original log cabin remains, and is now surrounded by the extensions that were built by Ernie Tully and his sons. In the early 1950s, a kitchen was added to the back, an enclosed porch was built on the front, and two bedrooms were added to the side. Later, in 1962, a bathroom and entryway were added to the back of the kitchen.

Also added to the property was "The Honeymoon Cabin", as it is still known today. This small structure was brought over from the Rutland Lodge property in the early 1970s. There is also a shed on site that used to be an ice house, before electricity was brought in. When it was still an ice-house, the ice was cut out of the lake, and preserved with sawdust.

After the Arthurs purchased it in 1984, the cottage remained much the same with minor updates and regular

maintenance for many years. Recently, however, it has undergone some more significant transformations.

In the summer of 2013, it was the subject of a renovation on a Cottage Life television show called "Weekend Reno." The main cabin was brought to life again, while leaving the history intact. The wall surrounding the stone fireplace had, at some point in time, been covered with paneling. This was removed, the log chinking replaced, and a slate hearth was added to the floor in front

of the fireplace. A propane fireplace insert was installed shortly afterward, providing a source of heat that no longer burns your eyes and fills the cabin with

wood smoke.

Although the cottage may look a bit different now, the history remains, and is appreciated by the current generations. It no longer requires the same level of upkeep and maintenance that the Seddon and Moir families would have experienced, providing more time to fully enjoy the lake experience.

The cottage has stood the test of time, three owners, and many generations. Children have spent their summers playing, building forts, swimming, catching frogs, and running wild over the years, while parents happily watch nearby. Family and friends have come together year after year to enjoy this little slice of paradise. This, like so many others on the lake, is a cottage that has been filled with love, joy, and laughter throughout the generations, and will be for many years to come.



FIRE SAFETY AT THE COTTAGE

On Christmas Eve 2016, a terrible fire engulfed a cottage on Stony Lake in the Kawarthas. Geoff Taber, Jacquie Gardner, and their teenage sons Scott and Andrew Taber lived around the corner from us in Toronto. Our family had just moved into the neighbourhood last fall and our paths had crossed with the Tabers only once or twice. Although we didn't know them well, our sons played on the same school soccer team. While watching the boys play one sunny September afternoon we struck up a conversation, as parents often do. We discovered a shared love of time at the cottage and told stories of the wonderful summer we had just spent there with our families. Later this fall, we frequently passed the Taber family home while walking our dog in the neighbourhood. When tragedy struck – inexplicably - this Christmas Eve, the entire Taber family was lost, doing what they loved to do in the place they loved the most. For so many of us, the cottage is our "happy place" and the place where we feel most relaxed. Time at the cottage provides a reprieve from the routine of life, a place where families spend time together, reconnect, and recharge. We can all use this terrible tragedy as an opportunity to make our cottages safer and minimize potential fire risk factors. This spring, when you open your cottage, take a few extra minutes to run through these cottage fire safety tips from the Ontario Ministry of Community Safety:

- Test smoke alarms at least monthly or each time you return to the cottage.
- Pack a new smoke alarm and extra smoke alarm batteries in case they need replacement.
- Install and ensure carbon monoxide alarms in your cottage if it has a fuel-burning appliance.
- Develop and practice a home fire escape plan to ensure everyone knows what to do if the smoke alarm sounds.
- Know the telephone number for the local fire department (911) and your cottage's emergency sign number, in case of emergency.
- Clean barbecues before using them.
- Keep an eye on lit barbecues and ensure all combustibles, as well as children and pets are kept well away from them. Fires can happen when barbecues are left unattended.
- Keep barbecue lighters and matches out of sight and reach of children.

When opening your cottage this year, make an emergency escape plan, and make sure everyone in the family knows it well.



If open burning is permitted, fires should be built on bare soil or on exposed rock.

Remove leaves and twigs from around the fire to keep it from spreading.

Always keep a bucket of water, sand, or a shovel close by and do not leave the fire unsupervised.

Fire Safety Continued

- Remember to bring a flashlight with extra batteries.
- Check heating appliances and chimneys before using them.
- Check with your local fire department, municipality, or Ministry of Natural Resources to determine whether open air burning is permitted before having a campfire or burning brush. If open burning is allowed, fires should be built on bare soil or on exposed rock. Remove leaves and twigs from around the fire to keep it from spreading. Always keep a bucket of water, sand, or even a shovel close by and supervise the fire at all times.
- If you must smoke, do so outside. Keep a large can with water nearby so cigarette butts can be safely discarded.
- If you drink, do so responsibly. Tobacco use and excessive alcohol consumption are contributing factors in many fires and can lead to serious injuries.
- Burn candles in sturdy candle holders that will not tip and are covered with a glass shade. When you go out, blow out!

There are fire teams located in both Cloyne and Northbrook. Addington Highlands Fire Chief Casey Cuddy, a veteran firefighter with 26 years of service, has 35 local volunteer firefighters on his team.

In the event of a fire, call 911 immediately.

In 2016 alone, the team responded to over 170 emergency calls, with 96 of those responses taking

place between May and September at the height of the summer cottage/camping season. Most calls resulted from structure, vehicle, and vegetation fires, medical emergency calls and motor vehicle accidents. The team also works hard to enforce public burning bylaws, implement fire safety bans, and provide public education on fire safety in the area. We are grateful to have this dedicated group of first responders close by in an emergency situation.

The SDRA has included an insert on Fire Safety with our newsletter this year. Please make sure to read and discuss it with your families and post it in your cottage as a reminder. Take a few minutes to create an emergency plan, ensuring that all family members (including children) know your 911 address, what to do if fire is detected, and how to quickly evacuate the cottage if necessary.

Last year was an amazing and exciting year for the Land O' Lakes Garden Club (LOLGC) as our group was busy planning and developing a project for Canada's150th Anniversary. We have joined forces with the Cloyne & District Historical Society (C&DHS) and Mazinaw-Lanark Forest Inc. (MLFI) for projects and an event that we hope will excite and benefit our community.

Our project and events for Canada's 150th consist of:

- Our LOLGC flower boxes that we plant each year in the community will be filled this summer with red and white flowers representing the Canadian flag colours. We are advertising and encouraging everyone to plant in a similar theme to create a tremendous red and white impact. So, think red and white please!
- In conjunction with our project partners, many young trees will be planted, along with a white oak donated by the LOLGC, on the property between the Pioneer Museum and Barrie Hall. This area was devastated by a micro-burst in 2002 when trees that were at least 200 years old were felled. The regeneration of the area is an exciting part of the project for our Garden Club. Along with our partners, the C&DHS and MLFI Inc., we will create a legacy parkland with educational signage for all to enjoy.
- The LOLGC has commissioned Ken Chatson, a local artisan, to create a metal bench which will be placed in the above area.
- Some of you are likely familiar with the tiny island between Oborne Island and the Blatchford's. It is known locally as Mike's Island. Laura's great-grandfather, Bill Schwager, was Mike's brother, and her great-grandmother, Matilda Bay, was the daughter of Johnny Bay, who helped build many of the original cottages, including our own. We have asked Laura Schwager and her cousin to design a plaque which will honour the First Nation Community whose footprints were first upon this land.
- For me, the most exciting part of this celebration has been finding a way to represent the whole of Canada for the 150th. I was overwhelmed with the response to an idea of painting the thirteen provincial and territorial flowers on plaques of marine plywood kindly donated by Brad Douglas at Home Hardware. We started with 8 volunteers, but very quickly we had twenty names of members wanting to be involved. Some were beginner painters and others more experienced, but all were enthusiastic. Throughout last summer, we met at my cottage and I could share my love of painting through teaching these enthusiastic volunteers. Having taught for more than 30 years, I was delighted to be able to pass on skills to those who showed an interest.



This brings me to our Canada 150 culminating event; a Community Party. We would like to invite all of you to the official unveiling of the projects at the Pioneer Museum Opening Day, in Cloyne. This event is planned for the morning of Saturday June 24 at 11:00 am. There will be local dignitaries, music, food, and fun. Our entire community of full time residents and summer cottagers are invited to partake and enjoy the festivities. We have a wonderful community of clubs and volunteers, and we look forward to you joining us on such a special occasion.



The Loon Lake Fire of 1895

A legend of an historic fire at Skootamatta Lake

Legends operate within the realm of uncertainty. They are never entirely believed by the participants, but are also never absolutely doubted. That was the way it was for our family......

In the mid nineteen seventies, our elderly neighbour, Douglas Alkenbrack, told my teenagers a horrific story. Behind our cottage, in the woods, there had been a house that burned to the ground, killing many in the young family who lived there.

You may not be familiar with the area. Sheldrake Lake meets Skootamatta Lake on what is now called Hughes Landing Road. That place that may have been called Gilmour's Landing in the nineteenth century. On the other side of Sheldrake, in a triangle with the smaller Topper Lake, we found the area where the tragedy might have occurred. Imagine our curiosity as we went to the spot and found an old stone fence covered with organic moss. Nonagenarian, Georgina Hughes, confirmed that her children used to play there, and brought home three cornered nails (the type used in rustic furniture in pioneer days). And so the search began. Who were they? How many of them were there? What were their names? Why did they live there? When did it happen?

Fast forward, through decades of unsuccessful inquiries. No one had ever heard the story.

Enter Pat Vlasic. Pat overheard my queries one day in Snider's restaurant. She thought she remembered her Grandmother telling her that her Great-grandmother, Margaret Lindsay, had survived a fire on Loon (Skootamatta) Lake.

Afterwards, Margaret was "a little bit strange." Pat contacted a distant cousin who had the answer passed down as a clipping from "The North Hastings Review" on Oct 10, 1895.

Douglas Alkenbrack was not born until 12 years after the fire. He spent his early years in Flinton, and the survivors escaped to that locale. There were many storytellers there (if you can, read "The Village on the Skoot"). He became one of them, and so we can thank him for turning a legend into an amazing report complete with the flowery and ornate language of that period.

SIX VICTIMS: AWFUL EXPERIENCE OF THE LINDSAY FAMILY

TWEED ONT. OCT 10

A fire occurred at Loon Lake, about thirty miles northeast of Tweed, on Tuesday night, Oct 9th burning the dwelling house of Mr. Thomas Lindsay. There were ten persons in the house at the time, six of whom perished in the fire, all [family] of Mr. Lindsay. The fire occurred about twelve o'clock at night and no one seemed to know how it occurred. There was besides Mr. Lindsay's family a man by the name of Peter Labarge and his son, who barely escaped by jumping from the second story window. Mr. Labarge is employed be the Gilmour Company in getting our timber and lost seventy dollars in cash and his watch and clothes. Mr. Lindsay is badly

burned about his face and hands. The Lindsay dwelling was situated between Loon Lake and Sheldrake Lake and the nearest neighbours are some five miles distant.

LATER

A full account of the burning of Thomas Lindsay's home at Loon Lake, near Snider's depot on Tuesday night has just reached here. This account only serves to confirm the report given last night and adds if possible to the horror of the catastrophe. The house occupied by the Lindsay family was a two storey building of the block type, the outside wall consisting of heavy squared timber. Once the fire got started the solid walls confined the flames, thus rendering the building a veritable furnace. The origin of the fire is a mystery. The first intimation to Mr.Lindsay of the impending disaster was the noise of the fire and [his family]. Lindsay jumped from a window and then went back into the fire to save his children. He was quickly overcome and fell down in the fire and was pulled out by his wife [...]. The house was in an isolated spot, being seven miles from the nearest neighbour.

running a pipe through will not solve the problem because the beaver will just dam the end. A metal cage built around the pipe and past the opening will allow the water to seep through. The beaver may continue to try to dam around the end of the cage, but will be unsuccessful to plug the pipe. The solution requires materials and labour but will last many years. You can see here a picture of Trustham's beaver baffler and others found online.

Last summer, we heard concerns from members about beaver dams that were causing damaging situations. Two obvious solutions often get discussed: remove the dam, or kill the beaver. These solutions are only temporary since the beaver will only rebuild the dam, or another beaver will move into the region once the territory is vacant.

We contacted Quinte Conservation and spoke with


their head ecologist, Tim
Trustham, to determine if a
humane solution existed.
Trustham recommended a
"beaver baffler" which he has
used successfully on his
property for the last ten years
with very little maintenance.

Beavers are instinctively compelled to dam water when they hear a flow. A beaver baffler is a pipe that runs through the dam to allow the water to move. However, just

The Lake Management Plan An update

During the 2016 AGM, the Board introduced the committee that was tasked with updating our Lake Management Plan (LMP). The LMP Committee continues to work on the document, focusing on restructuring the format of the LMP, adding new content that has become available since the last major update, and ensuring consistency with other similar documents.

Invasive species, water levels, and a variety of human impacts are some of the topics that have been gaining prevalence in the past couple of years. We want to ensure that we are giving these issues, among others, full consideration in the LMP as we plan for the future health of our lake. As the SDRA's lakes and surrounding environment changes, the LMP needs to stay current and focused on the most pressing issues.

In particular, we will be expanding the bi-annual water testing. This year, we will be testing ten sites for ten different parameters, including E. Coli, calcium, phosphorous, and several others. These tests will closely mirror the tests that were completed in 1974 by the Ministry of the Environment. This data will provide the committee the opportunity to see how the lake health has changed over the last forty years. Stay tuned for the results and analysis!

The Lake Management Plan is designed to be a living document, updated as the needs and health of our lakes change.

As a living document, the LMP is meant to be updated regularly and to stay current with the issues that are facing our lake. This will only be the first of many changes. If you are interested in becoming a part of the LMP Committee, please get in touch with our Lake Steward, Joel Arthurs.

Dam Operations and Water Levels

In 2016, water levels were a big concern for many cottagers. The previous winter had a lower than average snowfall, and additionally did not have much ice accumulation on the lake. Although the logs were placed according to schedule, the unexpected early ice-out meant that the water levels were lower than usual at the same time of year.

Low rainfall in the spring and several dry spells also resulted in low water levels for communities that rely on Skootamatta River for water. In order to maintain access to water for these communities, logs from the Skootamatta Lake dam were pulled throughout the summer.

The SDRA board was in regular contact with the Quinte Conservation Authority (QCA) in order to provide details to the membership on any changes to the conditions. We were able to confirm the date of the draw down for late-fall and warned members to pull their boats before this date.

In addition, QCA reported that the logs were due for replacement last year. Through various contacts within QCA and MNRF, we learned that the replacement of the logs had been scheduled and completed late last year. Water control measures were implemented to allow for easier replacement of the logs and to ensure that water levels were minimally impacted. This spring, the dam site will be cleaned up and the logs will be jacked and sealed as part of log replacement operations.

The board will continue to maintain discussions with QCA to ensure logs are placed early enough this year, and we will provide updates as they come available. 17

Invasive Species Act

Following the enactment of the Invasive Species Act in 2015, it came into force on November 3, 2016. Recently, the Province released a regulation under the act that details which species are either prohibited or restricted.

Prohibited Species are not allowed to be brought into, released, or deposited in Ontario. A person may not transport, propagate, or sell the species. Restricted Species are not allowed to be brought into a provincial park or conservation area. It cannot be deposited or released in Ontario. All restricted species must comply with any prescribed regulations that relate to the transport, propagation, or sale of the species.

The regulation (O.Reg 354/16) also lays out what should be done if someone comes into contact with an invasive species. In short, every effort must be made to destroy the invasive species identified in the regulation. The Act details enforcement, inspections, and penalties. For example, if a person is found guilty of a first offence, the fine is up to \$250,000. A second offence is up to \$500,000. Corporations can be fined \$1,000,000 for a first offence and \$2,000,000 for a second offence.

Means of species transport could include moving a boat, ATV, or trailer from one environment to another without properly cleaning the vehicle. The regulation also details that invasive species must be removed from a boat prior to the boat being moved over land.

As a cottager, if you use your boat on more than one lake, it is your responsibility to ensure that your boat is washed prior to transport. Although we have not yet been successful in establishing a boat washing station, this is something that the SDRA board is continuing to pursue. In the meantime, you can effectively clean your boat by washing the boat and trailer with hot water; a power washer works best. Chemicals and soaps are not necessary.

Fishes in Skootamatta By Anders Holder

First of all, I would like to thank everyone who helped me with various aspects of the project. From borrowing a boat, to docking access, and the comments, suggestions and encouragement from everyone I meet, it is great to see so many cottagers wanting to help understand and protect the lake.

Over the past decade, there has been a growing concern that Skootamatta Lake has been changing. These concerns include fish population changes, water quality degradation, and climate change effects. While there have been studies conducted in the past, it is difficult to identify a trend in the data. There is consistent mention of the abundance of introduced Rainbow Smelt and its effects on Walleye, Lake Trout, Lake Whitefish and Cisco populations. Beyond game fishes, I am interested in the possible changes in the smaller fish communities.

Last year saw a decline in water levels, low precipitation, and high temperatures. All of these factors will be considered when analyzing the sampling data. To add to the data from 2016, I will be back out this summer to conduct another round of sampling. I encourage all who are interested in what I am researching to reach out via email or go to my Facebook group: "Skootamatta Science".

Happy 50th Anniversary...

.... to the last group of properties sold by the crown in 1967, also known as the properties from 1689 to 1793 Hughes Landing Road. A group of twenty lots, more or less an acre in size, were made available for purchase in July of that year. The demand was great and the day the lots went up for sale, the first person in line waited since 10 p.m. the night before. By 6 a.m. there were five anxious people waiting to purchase their dream lot. All but one property was sold by September of that year, at a price of roughly \$3 per waterfront footage, which seems like a deal, but minimum wage at the time was roughly \$1.00 per hour.

The owners were required to erect a livable structure within the first two years. The land was raw and the ground was rocky, requiring many truckloads of fill, priced at \$10 per truckload, to be hauled in. The road was not built, nor was electricity available in the early days. The owners either carried in their equipment or barged it over by water. A barge was available for \$10 per day.

Most of the families were young with small children. Families assisted each other in building their cottages within the stipulated time to create a supportive community. Today only five of the original twenty families still own their property: Kallina, Houston, Castellano, Pauzer, and Murrell, and they speak of those early years like they were yesterday.

Membership Fee Update

Canopy tents, festival games, storage sheds, signs, kiosks and water hoses have all been purchased over last few years. Our cash reserve is at a comfortable level of approximately \$20,000 and we have a good understanding of our annual operating costs. Our membership has also reached the desired 200 member mark!

After careful analysis and consideration, the SDRA board is pleased to announce that we have decided to implement a fee decrease of \$10. This decrease will apply to 2017, 2018, and 2019. Fees for 2017 will therefore be \$40. With normal cost increases, we expect to be able to maintain our costs relatively balanced over the next three years with only small potential dips into our healthy reserve.

In an ideal situation, this decreased fee may attract more members to help cover our overall costs and possibly allow us to extend the fee decrease for additional years. But this remains to be seen, and we will reassess in 2019.

We have also adjusted our membership form to allow members the opportunity to make a direct contribution to the Food Bank. For those that contribute, their donations, including their names and email addresses, will be sent to the Food Bank administration, who will issue tax receipts for contributions greater than \$10.

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


