



Previously, there had been a number of similar events on the lake. In the 1970s and 80s, and likely even earlier, there were horseshoe tournaments, corn roasts and swim races at the Hughes General store, some sponsored by the SDRA, and some sponsored by individual families. There also were sailing regattas at other parts of the lake, and other events held at Trail's End and the Upper Lake beach. In those days, word travelled by the newsletter or word of mouth, and many were not aware of these events. Now we can notify people almost instantly. While the detail of these events are somewhat foggy in my memory, what I do remember is meeting people, lots of activity, and a friendly community feeling.



When we planned the first "Lake Festival" in 2011/12, we had a simple mission in mind: to

bring families together, and to help foster memories for the next generation. Our original framework of kids' games, running, water races, and a BBQ lunch has proven successful. We see many families returning each year, and the feedback has been positive. We are open to new ideas and leadership, so raise your



hand if you want to help, organize, or introduce new ideas.

In 2018, we changed the format slightly

to fix the kids' games to ninety minutes in order to give our volunteers the opportunity to cheer or participate in the races. This small change made a big difference to our volunteers.

Also, we introduced new minute-to-win-it games. We witnessed many children (and adults) determined to win. Come see what new activities will be offered this year.

The delicious food was again hosted and prepared by Susanne and Mike Stevens and the delightful homemade desserts were all prepared by Jill Cote. We are so fortunate to have these generous people part of our community.

# QUINTE CONSERVATION OPERATIONS UPDATE

# LIFE JACKET & PFD SAFETY



Do you have a collection of old life jackets in your shed or boathouse?

Ever wonder if they are still approved?

Do life jackets expire?

**Know the Regulations:** All boats in Canada must have a Canadian approved (Transport Canada or Coast Guard) life jacket or PFD for each person on board. Approved means it carries an approval label from Transport Canada or the Coast Guard, but beyond that the life jacket must be in a good state of repair, provide the right level of buoyancy and fit you and each of your passengers appropriately.

What constitutes expired? It's easy to know if your inflatable life jacket has expired since the canister is clearly labeled with a date indicating when it should be replaced. While foam life jackets don't have such a clear expiry, it is generally the foam filling that can lose some of its buoyancy over time, making the jacket less effective. In addition, any jacket which has been altered, is torn or is damaged is not approved for use.

Inspect your life jackets regularly to ensure they are safe. Make sure belts and zippers are working properly. If the foam is compressed it has likely lost some of its buoyancy. A good way to check is to pinch the foam section of the life jacket tightly to half its thickness and watch to see how quickly it recovers. You should also test its buoyancy by wearing the jacket in chest deep water and testing its ability to support you and keep your chin above water.

Take good care of your life jackets. Keep them out of the sun, dry them after use and don't use them as seat cushions or boat bumpers. Most importantly, a life jacket can only save your life if you wear it!

Treat your life jackets with respect.

Remember they are intended to save lives!

# THE BLAKE ISLAND CHRONICLES

## **ABRIDGED VERSION - 2019**

When I set out to capture how the founders of Blake Island came to be, I had no idea of the ripples that would be generated. Blake Island had become a special place to me and my family, largely thanks to Ken and Miki Meikle and also to Dick and Edna Blake, and I just wanted to capture the "how" of what we had grown to treasure. In 2002, I wrote Blake Island Chronicles documenting how Dick Blake had met Bob Chinnick while assigned to the Canadian Armament Research and Development Establishment (CARDE) in Valcartier, Quebec. Bob regaled Dick with stories of fishing and camping at Skootamatta Lake as a child. His dream was to build a cottage there. In 1959, Bob invited Dick and Edna

with Skootamatta Lake. The Blake family continued their camping vacations and in 1960, while camping at Cavendish Beach, Prince Edward Island, they met Ken and Miki (Margaret) Meikle and family. Ken and Dick's mutual backgrounds of Naval service and Queen's University as well as love of water and family composition, led to a lasting friendship. Both families were, at that time, stationed in Ottawa. They traveled together to Skootamatta to check out Island #6. There were 5 lots surveyed on the island and the Ministry insisted on an "all or nothing" purchase. The Blakes were then posted to Washington, D.C. Their

neighbours were Dr. Johan Cammermeyer and his wife Margret. Johan stopped in for a visit one day while Dick was showing a home movie of Island #6. Johan fell in love with it immediately, as it reminded him of his native Norway. Soon thereafter, a trip to the Land Registry Office in Tweed was made to put in the Blake/Meikle/Cammermeyer offers. It took until 1970 for survey issues to be resolved and applications approved.

Johan and Margret Cammermeyer made annual pilgrimages from Washington with their two sons to their "piece of heaven". The property was sold in 1987 to a couple from Belleville and sold again in 1988 to Joanne and Lou Volpe who have raised their four boys, reveling in its beauty ever since.

Dick and Edna shared their summers and memories with 5 generations of family and countless friends. No matter where in the world the family was, they always felt they were "coming home" to the Island - a lovely constant through the years. Likewise, Ken and Miki shared their summers and hospitality with 5 generations of Meikle/Martin family and countless friends. Joanne and Lou are currently sitting at 4 generations of family and friends enjoying the splendor of Skootamatta.

Blake Island is named after Dick Blake's brother, William Vincent (Bill) Blake. When Dick heard that unnamed geographic features could be named after decorated casualties, he wrote to the Federal Government seeking permission to name the Island after his brother, giving them the details of his Distinguished Flying Cross

(DFC). They approved, and Island #6 was re-named Blake Island. While William Vincent Blake received the DFC for a particular mission, the most important mission of his life, and sadly, the last, off the coast of Sweden, went unrecognized by the Canadian - or any other - Government.

A ripple effect of the Blake Island Chronicles came after presentation to the Cloyne and District Historical Society (CDHS) and the book was entered into the archives of the Cloyne Pioneer Museum in 2006. Also in 2006, an abridged version of the Blake Island Chronicles appeared in the SDRA Newsletter.

In 2007 - another ripple - the CDHS created a plaque to commemorate William Vincent Blake and it was installed on Blake Island in a ceremony on July 1, 2007. A short time later, another ripple - UK-based Kate Tome was researching stories of WWII airmen for the British website called Aircrew Remembered. She came across William Vincent Blake's story in the CDHS. Her report detailed how Bill's team were laying mines off the coast of Norway when their plane was attacked and severely damaged. Bill managed to parachute his injured and able crewmen to safety over neutral Sweden and headed his plane out to sea. His plane was eventually found, however Bill's remains were never recovered leaving his family broken-hearted and forever hopeful.

In April 2014, another ripple - John Johansson of Solvesborg, Sweden became aware of the 70th anniversary of William Vincent Blake's final mission. He convinced local Swedish authorities of the need to honour the pilot with a memorial.

In September 2015, a Hamilton Spectator Article was written about Dick Blake and his brother's final mission. Around the same time, the ripples continued as members of the Blake family were contacted by Swedish authorities and five members of the family flew to Sweden to attend

the commemorative ceremony for William Vincent Blake. Daughters Dr. Jennifer Blake and her husband Dr. Denny DePetrillo, and Christine Watson and her husband Richard, as well as Dick and Edna's granddaughter Caroline Blake, were in attendance while Dick and Edna participated via Skype. A plaque was unveiled on land. The family was taken by boat to the area where Bill's plane had gone down - a ceremony was held and a flower wreath and poppies were placed upon the ocean waters. A capsule with mementos from the family (including some from Blake Island) and a letter from Dick to his brother was put into the sea. To the final strains of Taps, the capsule slipped below the surface of the still waters. The ceremony was a proud yet emotional time for the Blake family. Finally, Dick could feel some sense of closure over the loss of his dear brother.

Sadly, Dick Blake, Ken and Miki Meikle are no longer with us but their legacy lives on. It has been an honour and a privilege to learn about life at the Island - to feel a connection to the past, to feel a path to the future - to see smiles on tiny faces when they wake up "at the cottage"; to hear the children mimic the sound of the loon or the bullfrog or the chickadee or the owl; to see how they want to share it with their cousins and friends and how, of all the places in the world they go, Blake Island is the best place on earth to be and a place where William Vincent Blake will be forever remembered. And the ripples continue...



# JULY 1<sup>ST</sup> AT SKOOTAMATTA LAKE

I feel this is the most important date for my family. My father, James Ross Oborne, was born on July 1st, 1915. Seven years later, he celebrated his birthday at Loon Lake on property my grandfather, A.R. Oborne, bought in 1922. ARO was the first cottager on the lake and many of the first owners were either friends or business associates of his. After he died in 1947, my parents took ownership of "Sunset Lodge." My two brothers and I spent every summer here. Each year we celebrated Dad's birthday. A second birthday boy came along with my Mum's brother-in-law, Lorne Loney, sharing the same day.

On July 1st, 1972, we gathered to celebrate 50 years at Skootamatta Lake. Many members of the original families attended: George & Betty Pearson, Chuck & Elena Schwenger, Eleanor & Bob Lindsay, Bob Blatchford, Ron & Willie Stevens, amongst others. It was a beautiful sunny day with many memories and laughs shared. We no longer had to park at Trails End as we had a road taking us across the causeway right to the cottage door. We no longer needed the ice box nor oil lamps as we had electricity. Times were advancing, though sometimes I miss the simplicity of evenings around the fire, and playing cards like "Pennies from Heaven," "Canasta," and Cribbage" with no television, internet, nor cell phones!

In 1974 my second son Stephen, aka David, was born on July 1st. Thereafter we had three celebrating

their birthdays around the dining room table. In 1995, again on July 1st, we gathered to celebrate 75 years at the lake.

Sadly many of the friends who came in 1972 had passed away.

Dad died June 28th, 2013, just three days from his 98th birthday. Family still came that weekend though our hearts were heavy. Lots of chatter about the "Good Old Days" and stories about Dad/Grandpa Ross. He really was an extraordinary man and I thank my parents and grandparents almost every day for finding this little bit of heaven on Skootamatta Lake.

Now, like most families, we come to the lake for the July long weekend. My four children and their families take turns coming for that weekend. David, his wife, and five children try to come to celebrate his birthday at my cottage. The original "Main" cottage belongs to my eldest brother Jim. A number of years ago my sister, Jan, and I were faced with a dilemma. Our parents were no longer able to host our Christmas get together so we needed to find another location. I had recently moved to my cottage full time so we decided to hold Christmas here. This would become an annual adventure. A new tradition. # LAKE STEWARD UPDATE

Well, you'd think when everything freezes that there wouldn't be much happening around the lake all winter, but instead it has been a busy winter with a new development policy, water test analysis, and a number of other topics, so let's get into it!

#### **Shoreline Vegetation and Tree Canopy Policy**

This winter, Addington Highlands passed a new development policy regarding tree canopy and shoreline vegetation. New development will require that lot clearing not be undertaken within 15 metres from the high water mark, but they recommend 30 metres. Within this zone, only a clearing 9 metres wide will be permitted leading up to the shore. This is great news for the health of the lake because shoreline vegetation keeps pollutants and silt from running off the land into the water.

The tree canopy part of the policy recommends that trees and vegetation that are removed for construction should be replaced by planting new trees and vegetation, in an alternate location.

This policy will be referenced by the Chief Building Officer during any construction/development applications.

#### **Water Levels**

In 2018, we saw water levels that were kept pretty high. Water levels for 2019 are hard to predict, but with all of the snow we saw this winter and a wet spring forecasted, the lake should start on a high note! The summer weather conditions will dictate water levels for summer and fall. Hopefully we see enough rain to keep levels steady, but not so much that we miss out on outdoor cottage time!

#### **Water Testing**

Every two years, we complete comprehensive water testing; 2019 will be the fifth such test. The data we have seen so far has been encouraging: our lake is very healthy and abundant with life. One of the more interesting things that we have discovered is that the calcium levels in Skootamatta are at such a concentration that Zebra Mussels are not able to survive in our water.

If you have any questions about water testing or would like to get involved with taking samples, please contact the board.

#### **Boat Washing**

Did you know it is actually illegal to move invasive species throughout Ontario? This includes those that hitch a ride on your boat or trailer. Be sure to give it a thorough cleaning when you pull it out of the lake. Boat washing is one of the most important things we can do to keep invasive species out of Skootamatta. If you move your boat between different water bodies, please be sure to clean your boat before moving it to another water body.

#### **Lake Management Plan Update**

We would first off like to thank everyone for your continued support over the last 3 years. It is always great to see so many people as passionate as we are about keeping Skootamatta Lake healthy.

This year's research will be expanding to include Sheldrake Lake and the largest source to Skootamatta, Wolfe Creek. Since both of these water bodies drain into Skootamatta, we will better understand how species interact with these water bodies, and how (dis)similar these areas are compared to Skootamatta.

This year we are hoping to get enough data from each site to be able to develop a trend analysis to understand what species exist in the lake, and how these species interact with each other. This will also help us to understand what changes are happening in the lake, such as climate change and invasive species impacts.

Overall, the word cloud effectively captures the things we love and cherish about Skootamatta. Thank you to everyone who participated. We will continue to research the history and origins of Skootamatta and share the findings with you.

# WEBSITE REPORT

This past year has seen a flurry of communication through the website and the SDRA Facebook page. Our membership is very engaged and we want to make that experience even better. The website has served as a vital place for the SDRA to communicate with members, allow for a place to buy and sell cottage stuff, and to renew your SDRA memberships. Over the past year, the website has been visited more than 7000 times, with most of the activity in late November and late March. Recently, the Board decided that it was time to move the website to a new platform to make things a little easier for our Web master, and hopefully add even more features that will help our members be a part of this great community. # **CAMPING ON CROWN LAND**

At the last AGM, one of the concerns that was raised by several members was the camping that occurs on crown land. Camping on crown land is a perfectly legal activity, however there are rules that the campers are to follow. For instance, clearing trees is not permitted, nor is littering. Staying at one site for more than 21 days is also not permitted.

In discussion with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, they advised that if any campers are seen damaging crown land, leaving behind garbage, or outstaying their welcome, then a call should be made to the MNRF tips line.

At no point should private citizens act in the capacity of a conservation officer or attempt to enforce these rules.

Anyone can make the call to report the incident, and the MNRF will investigate. To report a natural resource violation or submit a tip, you can call the MNRF TIPS line at 1-877-847-7667.

The Friends of Bon Echo Park is dedicated to preserving the natural and cultural heritage of Bon Echo Provincial Park. Mazinaw Rock, a spectacular granite cliff, rises 100 metres straight out of the water and is the home to ancient cedars and species-at-risk, including peregrine falcons and five-lined skinks. The 'Rock' is also the site of more than 260 pictographs painted onto the rock by Algonkian-speaking peoples. These symbols were Painted using red ochre and are dated as between 300 and 1,000 years old, for which Mazinaw Rock was named a National Historic Site in 1982.

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
